Biblical Principles Of Parenting (Part 8)

<u>Prov 1</u>; This is the last message in our series on parenting; And we've covered a lot – from seek the Lord yourself, to make sure you discipline

And if I had more time, I'd include others like – have fun, wrestle often, make memories, and hug them every day

The purpose of which, is to raise our kids according to the truths of God's Word, for a house built to last (**Intro**)

And while many of those truths, *many* of the passages in Scripture *apply* to parenting, some of them would be considered **Pillar Passages**; Primary passages; Like . . .

Prov 22:6 – Train up a child in the way he should go

Dt 6:4-9 – You shall teach God's commands diligently to your kids

Eph 6:1-4 – Bring your children up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord

Heb 12:5-11 – What son is there whom his father does not discipline?

Prov 13:24 – Whoever <u>spares</u> the rod <u>hates</u> his son

Ps 127:3-5 – Children are a heritage from the LORD

Those are the main Scriptures about parenting; And I would encourage you to remember one or two, and write the rest in the margin; Next to them (**Summary**)

➤ That said, there are 2 *remaining* principles I want to commend to you, that are last, but certainly not least; Starting with this – *communicate* with your kids; That's . . .

Principle #12 – Communicate with them (Prov 1:8)

Talk to them; And talk *with* them; A principle found all *over* the Word; With Proverbs the tip of the spear; It's *filled* with references to parental communication

Like <u>Prov 1:8</u> where Solomon says – <u>Hear</u>, my son, your father's <u>instruction</u>

He's talking to him; Communicating with him

Or how about Prov 2:1 – My son, if you receive my words and treasure up my <u>commandments</u> with you [if you listen to my communication] . . . [5] then you will understand the fear of the LORD and find the knowledge of God.

Or how about Prov 3:1? My son, do not forget my teaching, but let your heart keep my commandments; He taught; He communicated

Or 4:1 – Hear, O sons, a father's instruction; He was communicating

And 5:1 - My son, be <u>attentive</u> to my wisdom; incline your <u>ear</u> to my understanding Proverbs is *filled* with references to parental communication

Not only that, but . . .

• The Bible is full of <u>examples</u>

Real life examples; From Abraham talking to his son Isaac, Isaac to Jacob, Jacob to his 12 sons, Jethro to his son-in-law Moses, David to Solomon . . .

The Bible is full of examples, of parental communication

Even the Apostle Paul communicated to his *child in the faith* – Timothy (1 Tim 1:2) And we ought to do the same; *Communicate* with your kids

B/c it's also . . .

• It's what God does with us

That's the 2nd part of this; Communicate with them, b/c that's what God does with us; *His* sons and daughters; **Ps 19:1-3** says...

[1] The heavens declare the glory of God, and the sky above proclaims his handiwork.
[2] Day to day pours out speech, and night to night reveals knowledge. [3] There is no speech, nor are there words, whose voice is not heard.

IOW the whole world is one great big bullhorn for God's communication Every moment of every day he's pouring out speech through creation

And, he communicates to us *explicitly* in his Word, the Bible (**Prov 2:6**)

For the LORD gives <u>wisdom</u> [it says]; from his <u>mouth</u> come knowledge and understanding; Knowledge and understanding . . .

That was recorded in the pages of Scripture, as men were carried along by the Holy Spirit (2 Pet 1:21)

Communicate with your kids, b/c that's what God does with his*****

 $3^{rd} \dots$

• It's what God commands

Ps 145:4 says – One generation shall commend your works to another, and shall declare your mighty acts.

It's a command – you shall; Not just for parents, but certainly including them

➤ If you're going to raise your son or daughter according to the discipline and instruction of the Lord (Eph 6:4), you have to converse with them

If you're going to train them up in the way they should go (Prov 22:6), you have to talk to them

If you're going to explain the gospel, teach the Word, help them think, show them how to live, and reprove them in discipline – you *have* to communicate

There's *a time to keep silence, and a time to speak* the Bible says (Eccl 3:7) – and parenting is *definitely* a time to speak

And then 4th . . .

• It's a two-way street

Communicating with your kids goes both ways

Parents, don't let your son use one-word answers; Or no answers at all

"But that's all he does, Pastor: He doesn't talk"

Then *make* him talk; "You're not leaving the house until you give me 3 sentences about your day"

"You're not playing a video game until you answer my questions and offer new information; You're not getting a phone or a car or anything else . . .

Unless you participate in family discussions"

They don't talk b/c you don't *make* them talk; You don't engage them; You don't force the issue and *make* them throw the ball back

Far too many parents just give up on this; And in so doing, they add to the generation of kids these days who don't know how to communicate

Not verbally; Not clearly; Not compellingly

They can text; But they can't carry on a conversation; They can't articulate a thought And if they try – it's often rambling or incoherent; Carrying it right into adulthood And then wondering why nobody listens to them; Or why they can't get ahead; Or get the *job* they want

It's happening; And it starts at home, with you; Their parent (Summary)

➤ So I want to give you 6 ways to *encourage* communication; 6 ways to develop it Call them . . .

Best Practices

Best practices for communicating with your kids; The first is this . . .

1. Ask good questions

Open-ended questions; Questions that can't be answered with a yes or no; And if they can, ask why; "Did you have a good day at school?" "Yes." "Why?" Ask good questions, and don't allow a grunt for an answer

2. Do high-low

At the dinner table, at least once a week, have everybody go around and share a *high* from their day, and a *low* from their day; And talk about them

We did this; And found it to be a great way to find out what was going on in our girls' lives; And hearts; And it afforded us some great teaching moments

3. Take them out

I'm referring mainly to dads on this one; Take your kids out, one at a time, once a week
It could be breakfast, lunch, coffee, or ice cream – just make sure it's scheduled & kept
I did this with our girls on Thursday mornings before school – for breakfast; And it was
one of the best things I've ever done

4. Cater to their time

When do they like to talk? Is it bedtime? In the car? After school? Over a snack?

Whenever it is, find it and cater to it

If it's after school, have the milk and cookies ready

If it's in the car, keep the radio off; If it's bedtime, allow extra time

Find *their* time, and cater to it; Not that it's the *only* time to communicate, don't let them think *that*; But make sure it's *one* of them

And make sure you listen more than you talk; Make it their time

5. Address important issues

Issues like sex, and puberty; Masturbation, drugs, alcohol, marriage, homosexuality You name it, you should address it; Openly and freely

Don't ever let your kids think that there's a taboo subject w/ you; Talk about everything

And do it early; Early and often; B/c I guarantee they're hearing it from others
We thought we were well *ahead* of the curve in all this, until our oldest, at the age of 4,
heard all about sex from one of her 6 year old cousins at a family funeral

That's great; Thank you so much for that

So we did some quick research, found some solid age-appropriate books, and began working through them – her and Becky

Address important issues early, and don't stop; Don't stop

➤ I remember a time just a few years ago on vacation, with two of our girls in college . . . When somebody brought up a slang term about something sexual, as we were driving back to our place

And before long, one question led to another and another and another – so that we ended up sitting in the car, in the garage, in the dark . . .

Talking about all things sex-related, for like 30 minutes

And there were a few times that Becky and I were wide-eyed and white-knuckled It was open, it was explicit, and it was needed

Don't be afraid, and don't hesitate, to address important issues with your kids

6. Journal with them

From the time our girls could barely print, we would send them to bed and give them time to write a note to us about their day, in a journal

And then, after we tucked them in, we'd sit outside their room and respond to their entry, with one of our own; On the facing page

You want to talk about precious, you want to talk about insightful, you want to talk about endearing – that was it

And a great way to teach them how to write (Summary)

6 practices, to help you live out the biblical principle, to communicate with your kids

And then last, but certainly not least . . .

Principle #13 – Pray for them and with them (1 Sam 12:23)

In 1 Sam 12:23, Samuel addresses the Israelites at the end of his storied career as prophet, priest, and leader

And he says something to them, the children of Israel for whom *he* was responsible . . . That I think applies just as much to us (**verse**), and the children for whom *we* are responsible

As for me [he said], far be it from me that I should sin against the LORD by ceasing to pray for you

Notice 2 quick things: (A) It was *sinful* to not pray for those in his care; (B) He was all about it; He was all *about* praying for them

Indicating he already was, by saying it would be wrong to stop praying

And if that applies to a leader of *people*, how much more to a leader of *kids*; A family Where the bond is tighter, the connection closer, and the heart fonder We *must pray* for our kids; They need it, and it's our responsibility*****

➤ So instead of talking about it, I'd like to take a few minutes to do it
Pray for your kids, your grandkids, your future kids, or someone else's kids (slide)
Pray that they would... Know the Lord; Love the Lord; Trust the Lord; Serve the
Lord; Return to the Lord

Let's do that right now; In the quietness of your heart, or with your spouse, or both Just get before the Lord and pray; And when the time comes, I'll close it (3 minutes)

Pray – Lord, thank you for our kids; What a blessing they are; Would you draw them to yourself? Would you fill them with the knowledge of your will more and more? Would you spur them on to walk in a manner worthy of their calling? Would you bear fruit in them for every good work? Would you give them a hunger for your Word? Would you strengthen them for your purposes? Would you stretch their faith? Would you prepare for them a spouse? Would you bless their union if already married? Would you return the prodigals? Would you save the lost? Would you restore the broken? Would you heal the sick? We trust you for them, and ask these things in the powerful name of Jesus, Amen.**** We need to pray for our kids

And, we need to pray with them; Pray for them, and pray with them At bedtime, dinnertime, special times, any time Lead them in prayer, and let them pray; Encouraging them to do so

It could be in the car when something comes up

It could be in your living room in the middle of your evening

It could be one-on-one at bedtime; It could be all together before you turn in

It could be circling up before you say goodbye

It could be over the phone; It could be anytime and all the time, and should be

The point being, don't miss an opportunity to pray with them, in addition to praying for them

➤ In fact, sometimes you should do it at the same *time*; Pray for them and with them at the same *time*

Few things bless people more; And your kids are no different

If you want to see them glow, if you want to put wind in their sails – pray *for* them and *with* them in the same setting

It's principle #13, to train up your child in the way they should go (**Summary**) *Biblical* principles, God-honoring principles, for a house built to last

If you're in the middle of that, God bless you; Keep on

If you're well beyond those years, pray for those who follow; And plant seeds of truth – give them these messages

If you don't yet have kids, encourage those who do; And prepare well

B/c a house built to last starts with a good foundation

<u>Pray</u> – Father, we're so thankful for our children; And so thankful for your Word to parent them well; Keep these things ever before us; And strengthen us for the task at hand We give now, with gratitude in our hearts, for all you've given us
